


Who is World Vision?

World Vision is a **global relief, development, and advocacy** organization dedicated to help the world's most vulnerable children, families, and communities to experience fullness of life by tackling the causes of poverty and injustice

For over **70 years**, World Vision has helped transform the lives of the world's poorest children and families in nearly 100 countries. Our community-development approach to ending poverty includes **nutrition and health**, **clean water**, **education**, **livelihood and economic growth**, **climate resilience**, **disaster response**, **and gender equality**.

We are dedicated to working with children in fragile contexts – areas fraught with extreme poverty, chronic instability, conflict and violence

World Vision's work spans across 3 key pillars to transform communities from surviving to thriving. In 2023, over 16.5 million children and adults were reached through our Canadian-funded programs.

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What are the real impact World Vision has made?

- o **World Vision is a Top 10 International Impact Charity in Canada.** We reached more than 61 million people over the past eight years, with programs in more than 66 countries.
- o Every month, 2.5 million people receive food assistance through WVC's partnership with the World Food Programme, saving nearly 10 lives every day.
- o World Vision trains nearly 35,000 every year with skills to improve their livelihoods more than the student body of Queen's University.
- o Every hour, 36 people get access to clean drinking water.
- o For every dollar invested in our literacy programs, more than \$7 is generated back to local communities in benefits such as lifetime earnings for the children who participate.
- o In the past five years, communities have saved the lives of 1,355 children by using our local advocacy approach to improve their health services.
- o For every dollar invested in World Vision's natural land reforestation programs, \$2 is generated in economic and environmental benefits.
- o In the past 5 years, more than 820,000 people have gained access to toilets and latrines that limit the spread of waterborne diseases.
